Course Description

This course focuses on the development and mastery of reading skills for university-level English expository texts and academic articles with an emphasis on the use of strategies and critical thinking skills that improve effective reading comprehension and vocabulary development. It will also focus heavily on the use of "annotation" to help students become "active" rather than passive readers, thereby greatly improving reading comprehension.

Course Objectives

- To develop students' reading comprehension with university-level texts and academic articles with the use of annotation.
- To equip students with strategic reading and critical thinking skills.
- To enhance students' vocabulary building skills.
- To develop students' ability to summarize paragraphs and articles.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course students will be able to:

- Expand vocabulary through practice and the use of a monolingual dictionary.
- Determine the meaning of vocabulary in texts by using context clues.
- Distinguish between definitions and any accompanying negative and/or positive connotations and use those to help determine facts, opinions, blended statements or an author's bias.
- Use pre-reading skills to activate schemata and predict content of texts.
- Annotate effectively for active reading, increased comprehension and retention.
- Read a variety of authentic college level readings: academic prose, literary forms, journalistic
 articles and scientific readings, and respond thoughtfully and critically, verbally and in writing, by
 drawing connections between personal experience, world knowledge and/or other sources
 (lectures, readings, films) and the assigned text.
- Recognize organizational patterns to increase comprehension.
- Become familiar with the wording and expectations of college exam questions.
